



**NOTICE NO. ADCB-6R-RC-2025-12**

**WARNING ON THIRD-PARTY ADVISORY  
IMF et al.**

December 4, 2025

African leaders and concerned market participants have brought it to the awareness of the African Diaspora Central Bank (ADCB) that third-party intermediaries, including handlers and/or agents of the IMF have made cautionary remarks against LUMI's integration.

This notice serves to inform the public, national central banks, third-party intermediaries, brokers and local market participants that ADCB participates in the recapitalization of Africa from 2025-2063 using (AKL) LUMI in its status as regional/continental legal tender. The recapitalization process advances African financial reform, recognizing that the current global GDP of approximately US\$117 trillion is fundamentally insufficient to facilitate African economic development, energy security, food security, technological advance, health care, poverty eradication, job creation, climate action, and other social advances.

Third-party partner institutions giving client advisory are reminded to adhere to African regulatory limitations, including Chapter 8, Article 28(1) of the Protocol On Relations Between The African Union (AU) and the Regional Economic Communities (RECs), which allows national and regional bodies to engage in third-party agreements:

*"...provided that such agreements do not conflict with the objectives of the Constitutive Act, the Treaty and the treaties."*

For greater clarity, third-party institutions and their related agents are advised that the continued usage of third-party currencies (dollar, renminbi, etc.) as the dominant instrument for intra-African trade in contrast to (AKL) LUMI and other local African currencies, directly conflicts with the objectives of the Act and the treaties.

Any advisory to the contrary should be deemed as misleading and wholly incorrect.
